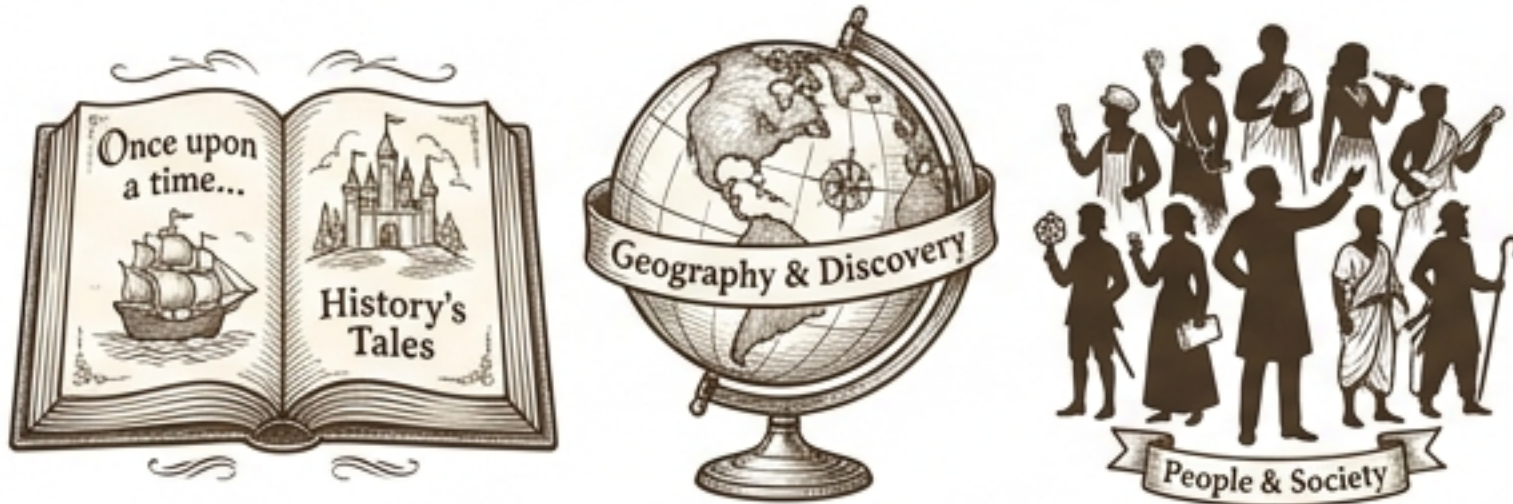

Social Science explains not just what happened or where it is, but why it happens and how different aspects of life are interconnected.



Shelter: Built with materials sourced globally (Geography).



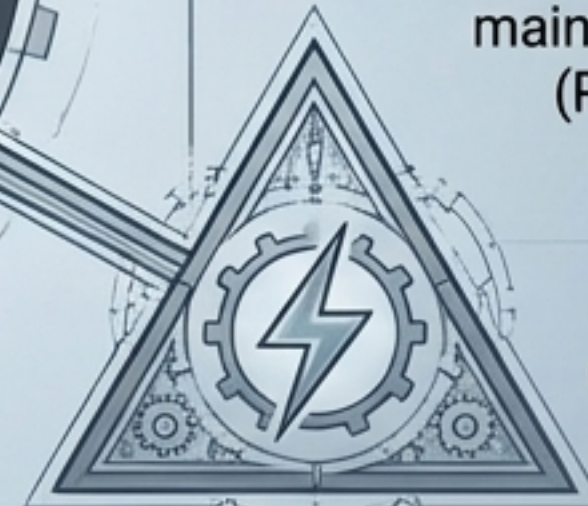
Education: Shaped by historical policies and traditions (History).



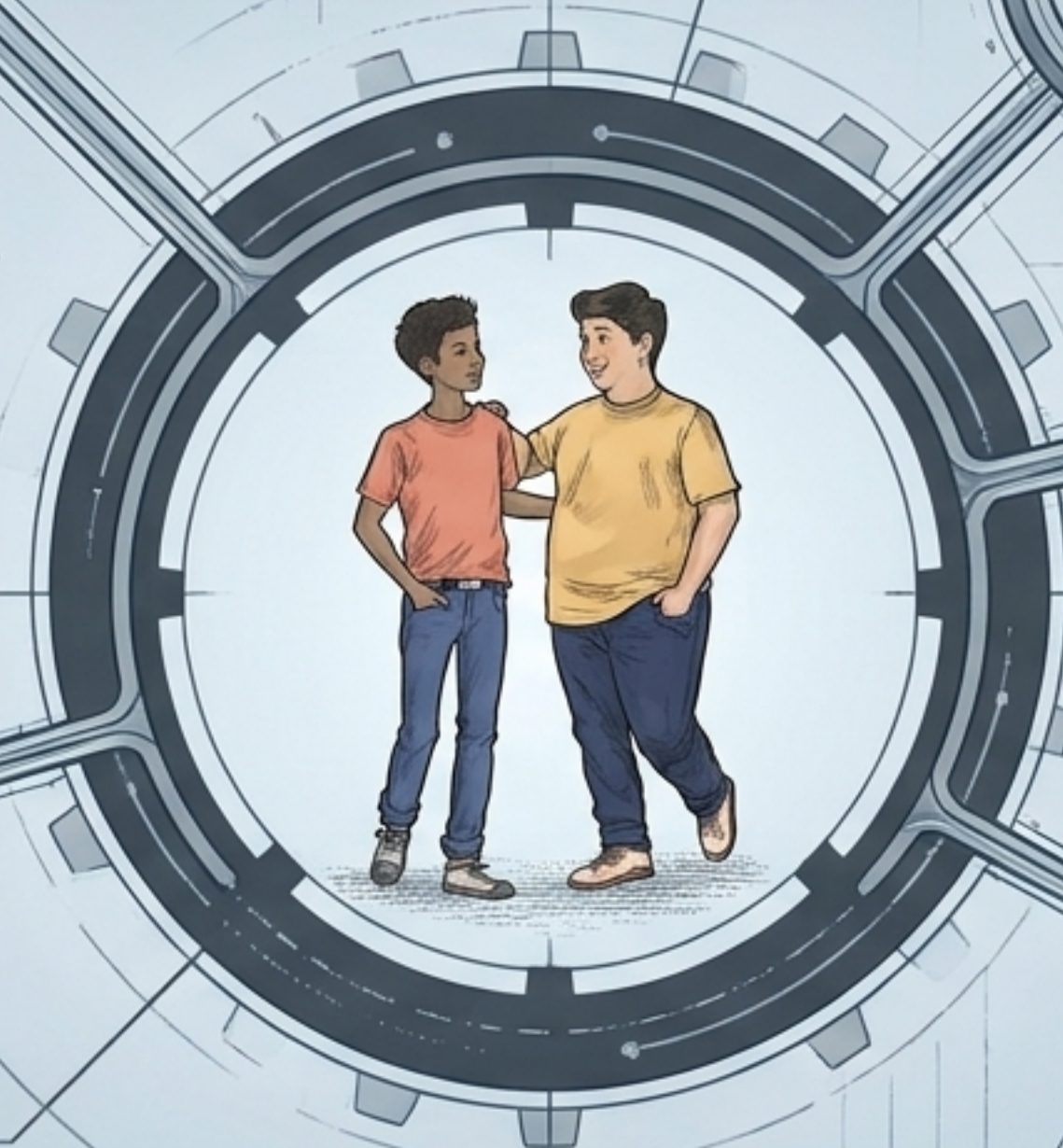
Food: Harvested, processed, transported, and traded (Economics).



Infrastructure: Planned and maintained by authorities (Political Science).



Energy: Generated distantly and delivered through networks.

Systemic Nature

Pañchamahābhūtas

Earth, Water, Fire, Air, Space.

Insight:

An early understanding of the natural world and human life as an interconnected system.

Global Interdependence

वसुधैव कुटुम्बकम्

The world is one family.

Insight:

Recognizing the deep interconnectedness of human societies across diverse regions and cultures.

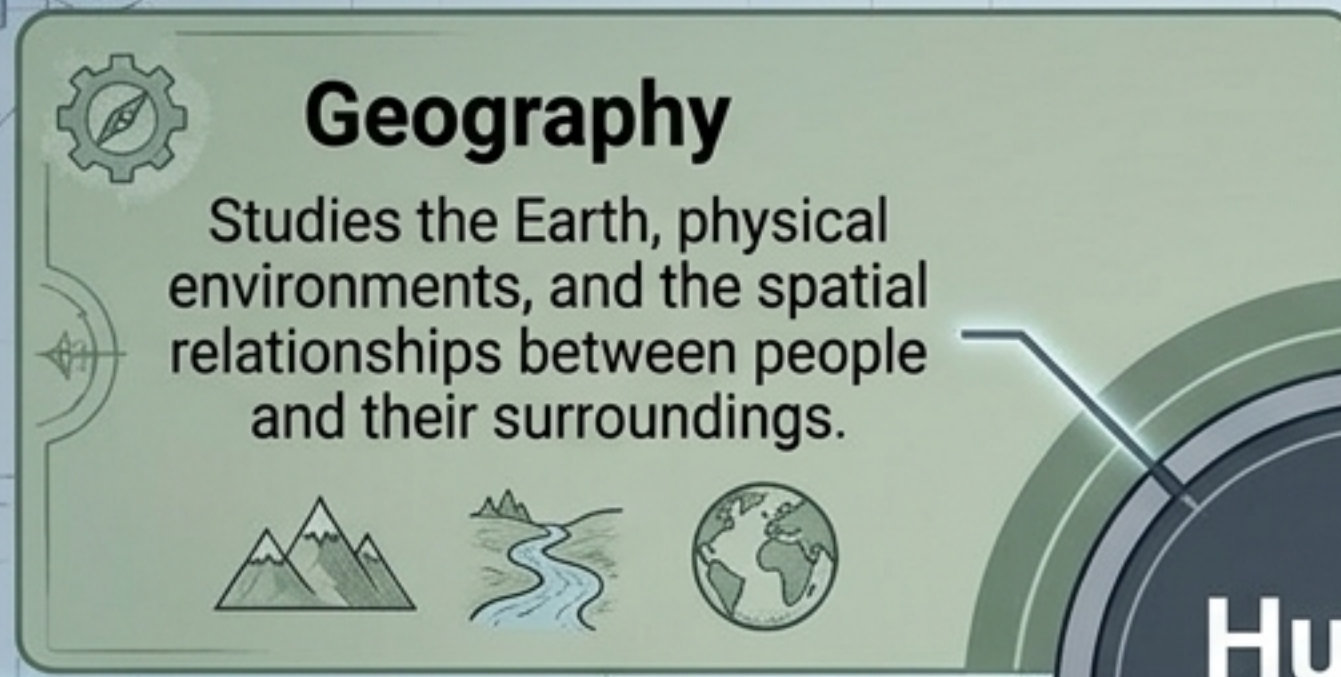
Systematic Governance

Arthaśhāstra

Attributed to Kauṭilya, composed ~2,300 years ago.

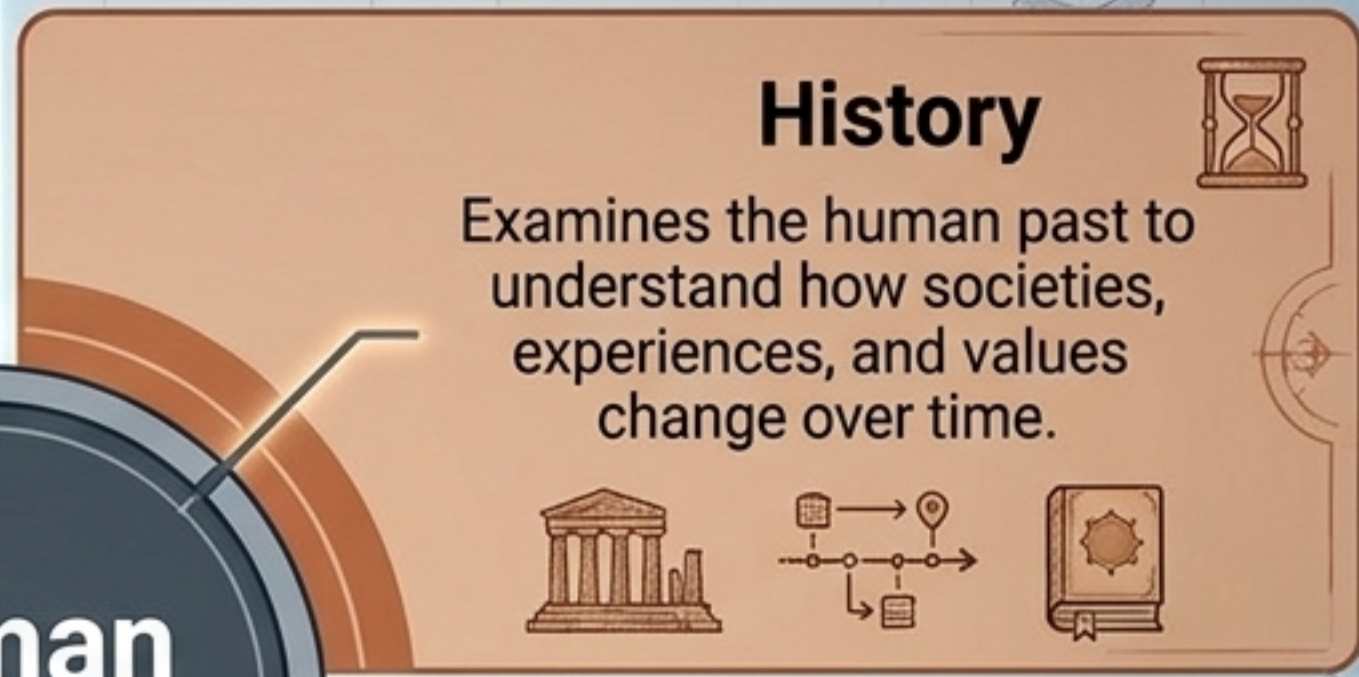
Insight:

Early, systematic thinking on administration, taxation, and the ethical duties of rulers.



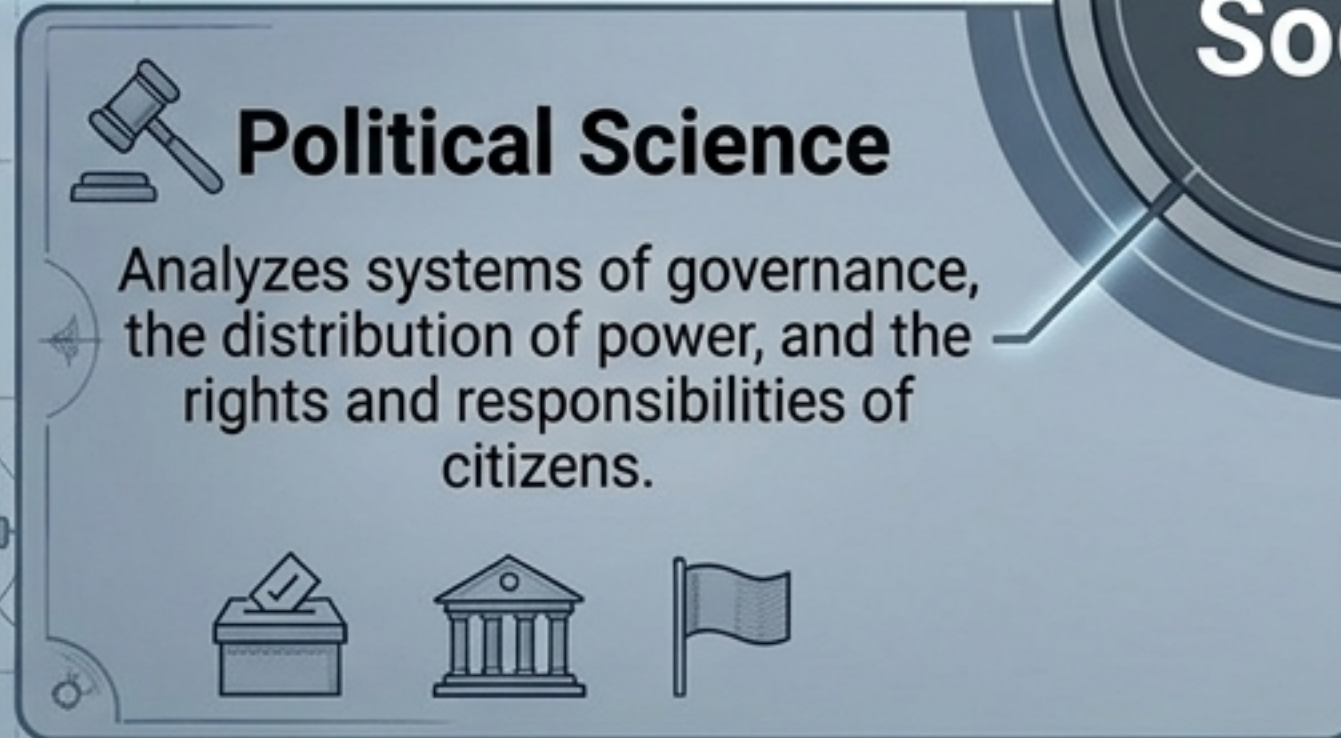
Geography

Studies the Earth, physical environments, and the spatial relationships between people and their surroundings.



History

Examines the human past to understand how societies, experiences, and values change over time.



Political Science

Analyzes systems of governance, the distribution of power, and the rights and responsibilities of citizens.



Economics

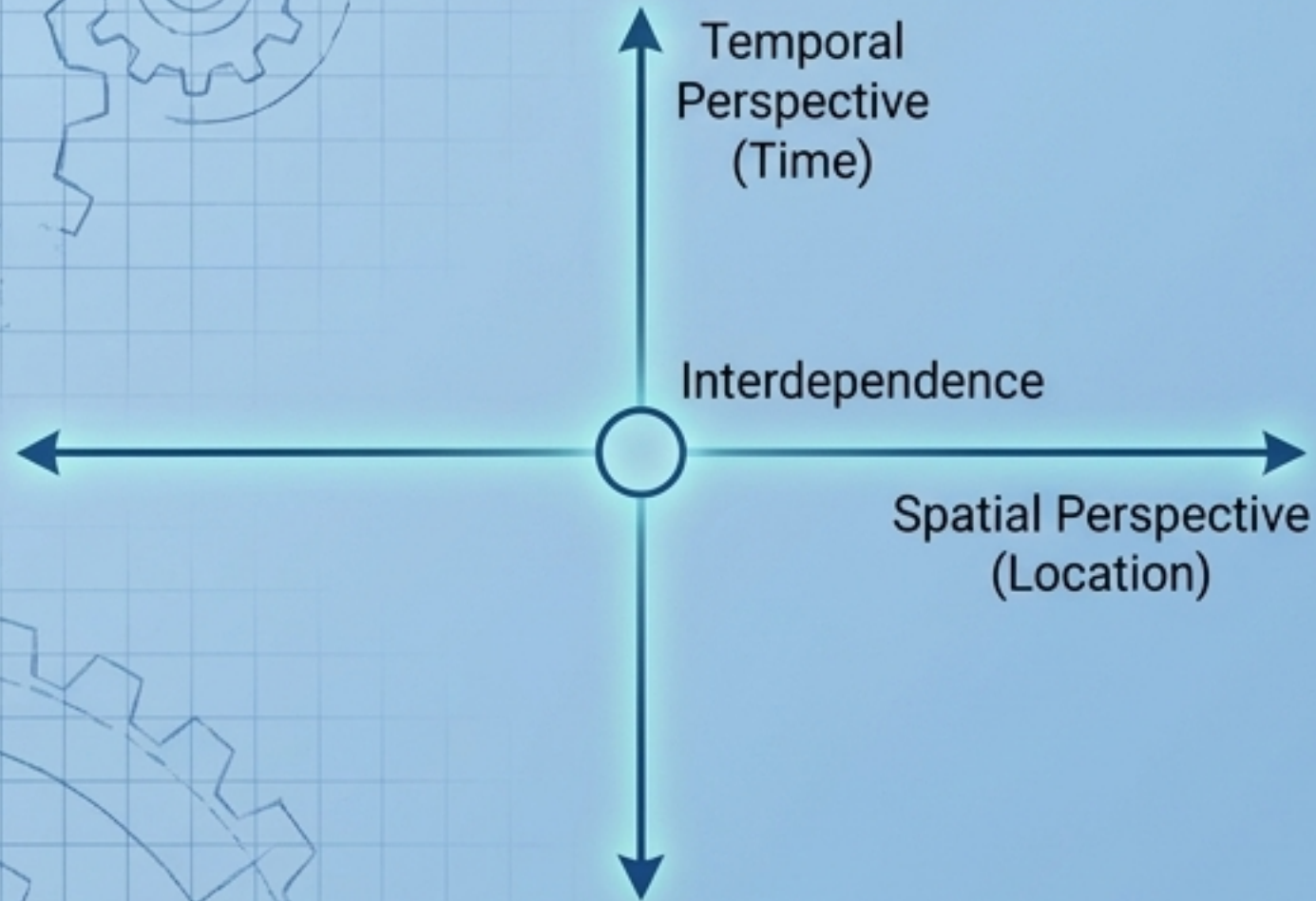
Explores how societies produce, exchange, distribute, and utilize limited resources to meet human needs.



Broader Context: Supported by related disciplines like Sociology, Philosophy, Anthropology, and Psychology. No single field can explain humanity alone.

Lens 1: Geography (Space & Interdependence)

The Concept



- **Core Question:** Where are things located, why are they there, and how do distant places affect each other?
- **Historical Context:** Explains why India's long peninsula facilitated global contact with Africa, Europe, and Southeast Asia.

Lens 2: History (Time & Evidence)

Phase 1: Cultural Memory



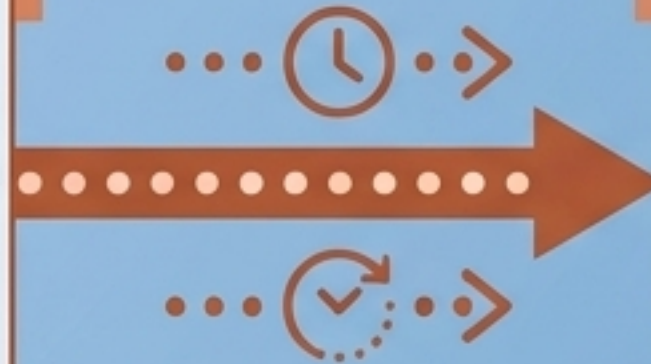
Tradition: The *itihāsa-purāṇa* tradition.



Method: Transmitting information through stories.



Purpose: Gives cultural meaning to events, reinforces enduring ideals, and provides a sense of identity and purpose.



Phase 2: Modern Historiography



Tradition: Scientific historical inquiry.



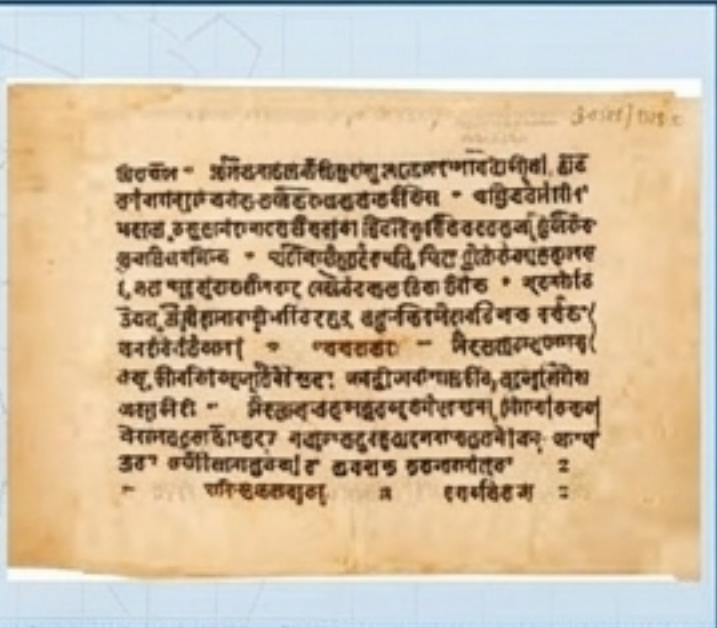
Method: Relies on empirical evidence.



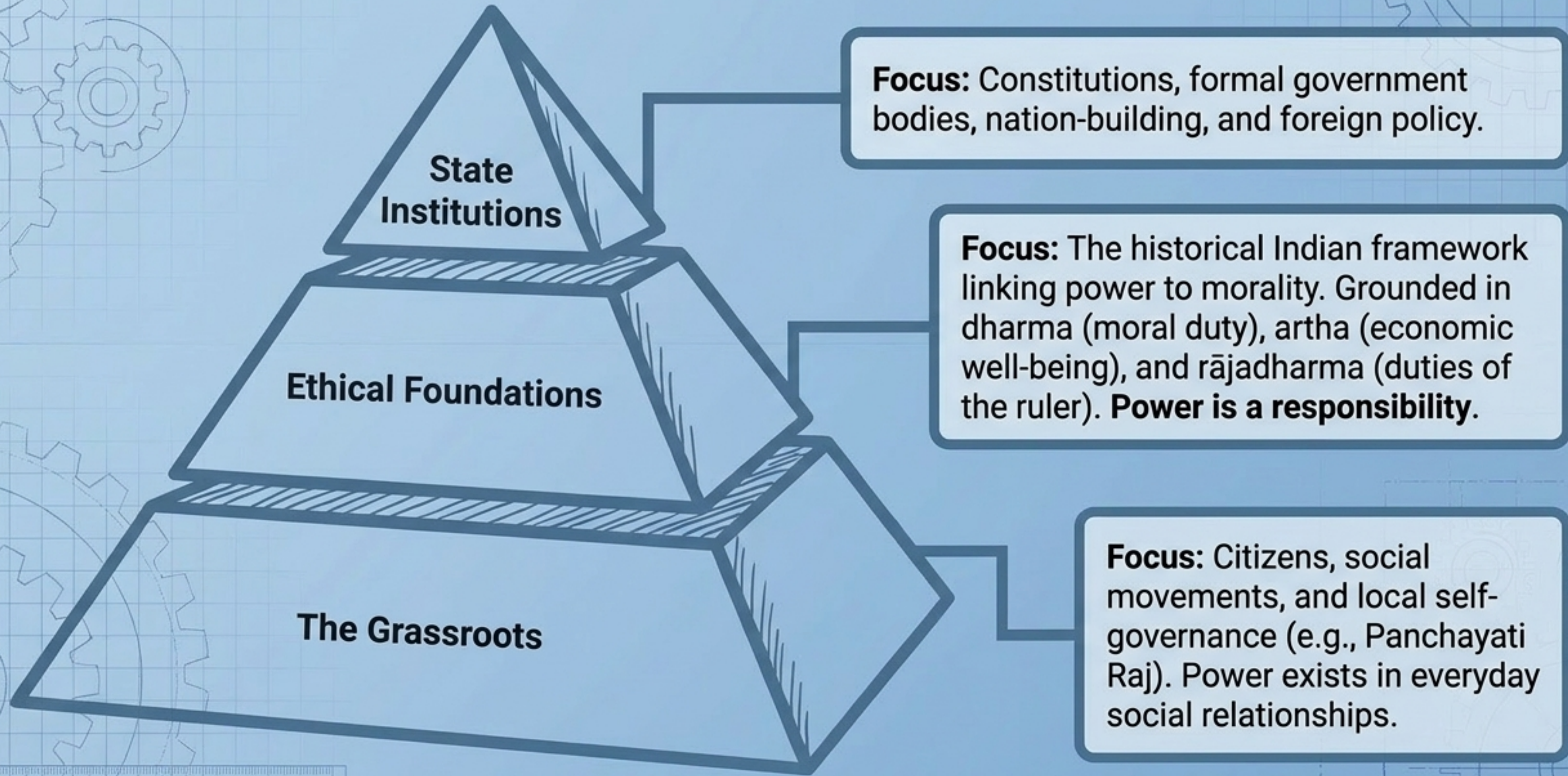
Tools: Archaeology, Carbon-14 dating, human genetics, and documentary verification.

Takeaway: History is not just recording the past; it is the rigorous interpretation of evidence to establish timelines and social realities.

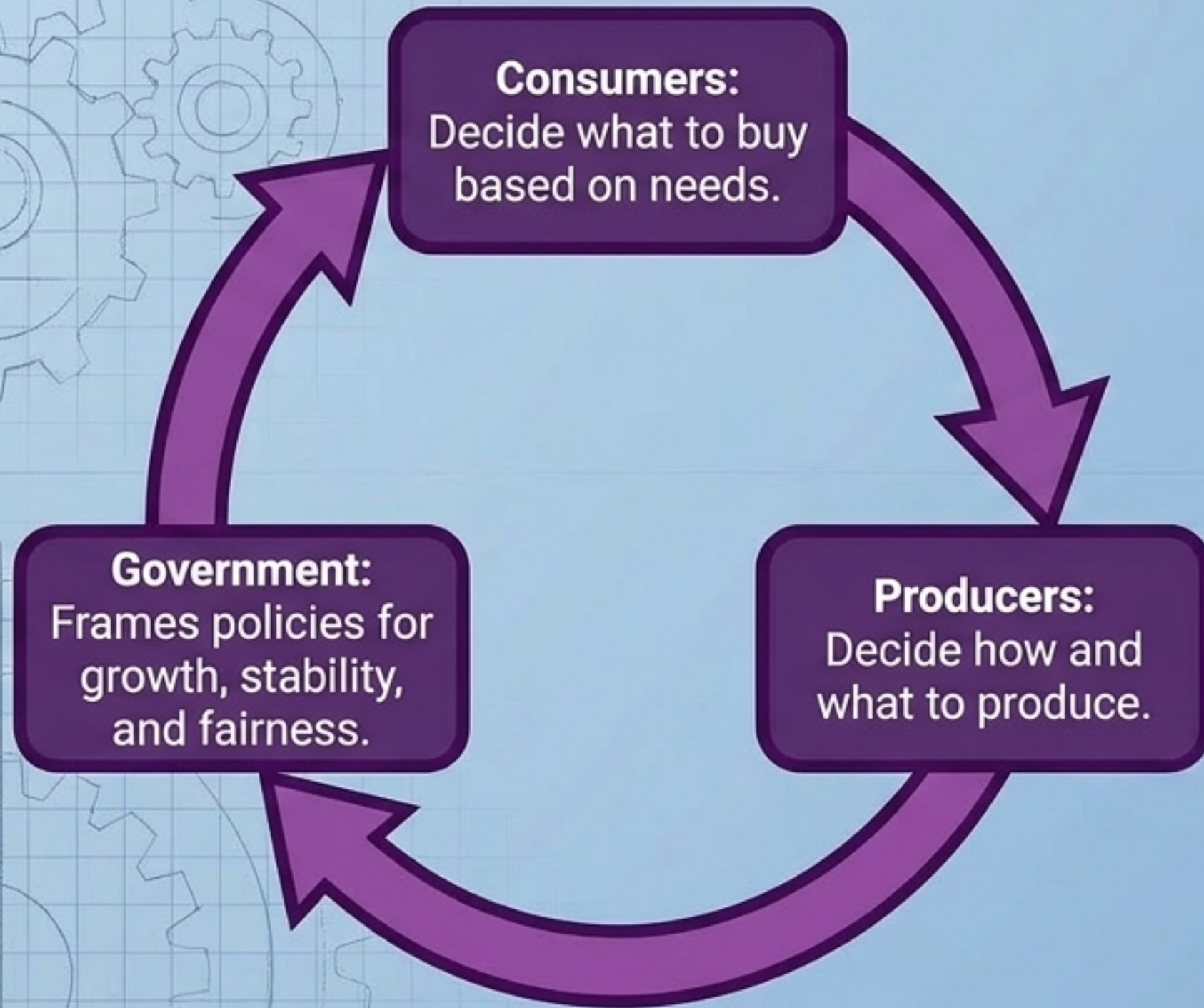
Diagnostic Matrix: The Sources of History

The Future: Sustainable development that meets present needs without harming future generations.

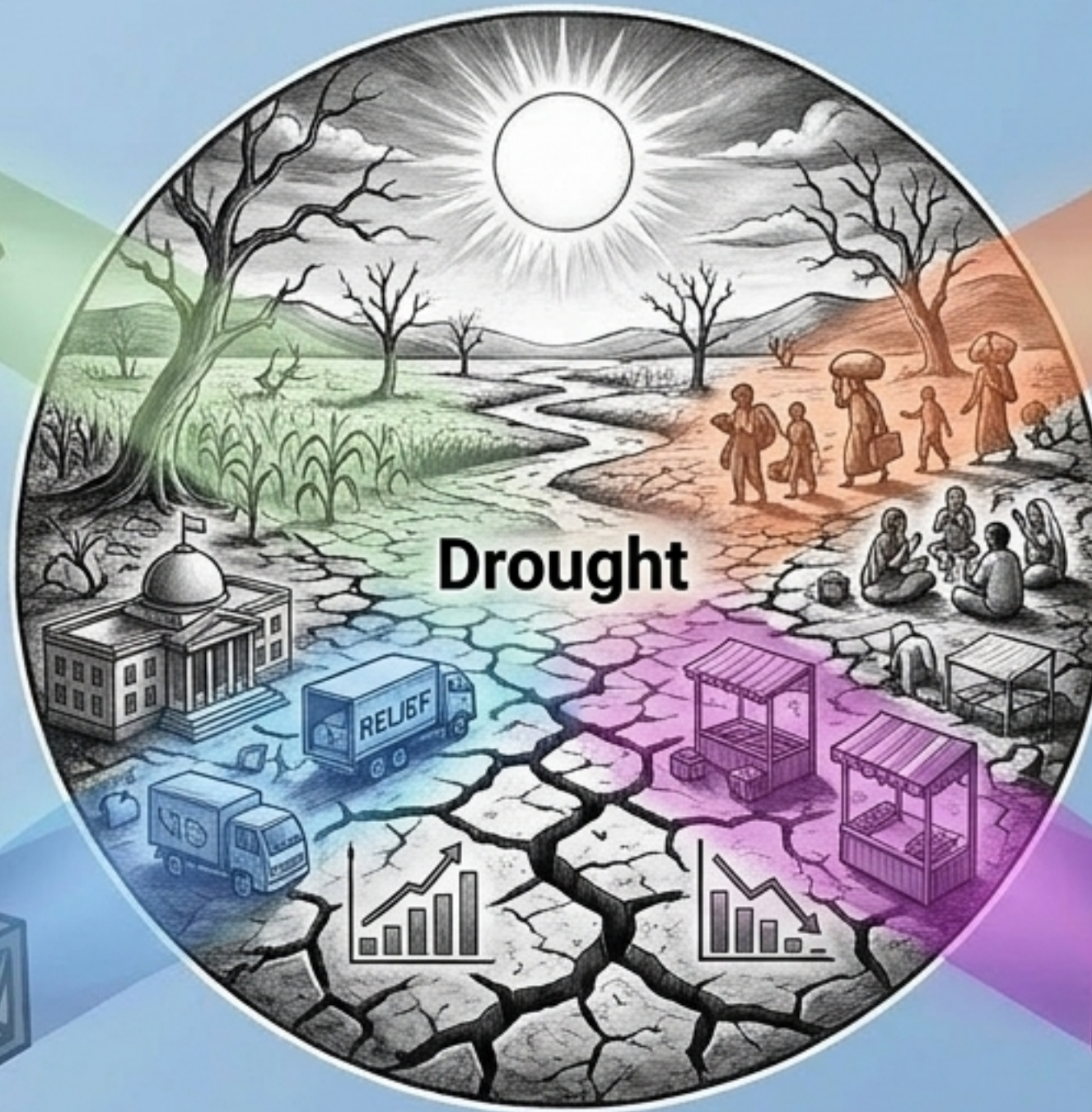
The Synthesis Arc: Anatomy of a Real-World Challenge

Geography Lens:

Analyzes environmental impact on soil and crop failure.

Political Science Lens:

Evaluates government relief measures and resource allocation.



History/Sociology Lens:

Observes migration patterns and cultural coping mechanisms.

Economics Lens:

Measures loss of farmers' incomes and market supply drops.

Real-world events do not respect academic boundaries. A holistic view is required.
